Interviewee- It just makes living here all the more special to know that they're right outside The woods that I walk in, that my kids play in, that the dogs go in, and then at night they are right there.

Interviewee- I walk, I run, I hike, I play sports, I do gardening, we have a fire pit outside.

Interviewer- What year were you born in?

Interviewee- 1976.
